Q

India is investing heavily in roads, airports, logistics, manufacturing, and smart cities. How do you think safety should evolve alongside that growth?

SUNIL LADWA

India has one of the world's fastest-growing infrastructure programs, with significant investments being made in highways, railways, industrial corridors, airports, and urban development. But growth creates responsibility. Every new road, warehouse, factory, and construction site must also be designed with safety in mind.

The World Health Organization estimates that approximately 1.19 million people lose their lives each year in road traffic crashes globally, and India accounts for one of the highest numbers of road fatalities. Those statistics remind us that infrastructure cannot be considered successful unless it is also safe. Investing in better traffic management, clearer signage, workplace protection, and safer environments ultimately protects lives while improving economic productivity.

You've spent nearly three decades in industrial and road safety. How has the industry changed during that time?

SUNIL LADWA

The biggest change has been awareness.

When we began, many organizations viewed safety primarily as a regulatory obligation. Today, leading companies recognize that safety is directly connected to operational excellence, employee well-being, and business performance.

Global manufacturers, technology companies, logistics providers, and infrastructure developers increasingly expect international safety standards across every project. That has raised expectations for product quality, training, compliance, and innovation throughout the industry.

Safety is becoming part of organizational culture rather than simply part of the procurement process—and I believe that's one of the most positive changes we've seen.

Technology is transforming every industry. What role do you see it playing in safety?

SUNIL LADWA

Technology is making safety more proactive.

Artificial intelligence, connected sensors, intelligent traffic systems, predictive maintenance, and real-time monitoring are helping organizations identify risks before incidents occur. Instead of reacting after something happens, companies can increasingly prevent accidents through better information and better decision-making.

But technology alone isn't enough.

The strongest safety cultures combine technology with leadership, education, accountability, and continuous improvement. Safety ultimately depends on people making the right decisions every day.

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Many organizations talk about building a 'culture of safety.' What does that actually mean?

SUNIL LADWA

A culture of safety exists when people make safe decisions even when no one is watching.

It means employees feel responsible not only for their own well-being but also for the people around them. It means leadership treats safety as a business priority rather than a compliance exercise.

Research consistently shows that organizations with strong safety cultures experience fewer workplace incidents, lower operational disruption, and higher employee engagement. Those outcomes don't happen because of one product or one policy—they happen because safety becomes part of how an organization thinks.

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What opportunities excite you most about the future?

SUNIL LADWA

India has an opportunity to become a global leader in safety innovation.

Manufacturing continues to expand through initiatives such as Make in India. Infrastructure investment continues at unprecedented levels. Smart cities, electric mobility, logistics modernization, and digital technologies are creating entirely new environments where safety must evolve alongside innovation.

I believe the next decade will be defined not simply by building more infrastructure, but by building infrastructure that is safer, smarter, and more resilient.

If we can combine innovation with education and long-term thinking, we'll create safer workplaces, safer roads, and ultimately stronger communities.

Looking back on your career, what leadership principle has remained constant?

SUNIL LADWA

Leadership is about responsibility.

Every product we manufacture, every solution we recommend, and every project we support ultimately affects people's lives. That perspective creates a different level of accountability.

I've always believed that lasting businesses are built by earning trust—through quality, reliability, and consistently delivering on commitments. When people trust your work, they trust you with responsibilities that matter. There is no greater measure of success than knowing your work has helped protect lives.
